

ARMADILLOS

We've seen them darting off into the brush or alongside the road. Here in Florida we have nine-banded Armadillos but there are over 20 species of armadillos world-wide. They are a medium-sized, armored mammal that is mostly nocturnal and generally found in the southeastern United States, but their range has been expanding northward the last 100 years, even as far north as Illinois. They prefer warm, wet climates, and forested or grassland habitats. They can live from 7-20 years in the wild. The term "armadillo" means "little armored one" in Spanish and refers to the bony, armor-like plates covering their body.

Nine-banded armadillos can not roll up completely like a few of their cousins can. They are roughly 2.5 feet long and weigh about 12 pounds. Nine-banded armadillos nearly always have litters of four babies, identical quadruplets. The babies look very much like adults, but are smaller and softer than their armored parents. When startled or scared, armadillos can jump four to five feet high. Usually this surprises any creature trying to



have it for lunch. Unfortunately, this doesn't work so well when startled by a moving car, which is why they are common road kill.

These guys are insectivores. They mostly eat bugs beetles, grubs, worms, spiders and termites. Once in a while they do eat fungus, fruits and seeds, as well as some carrion. But they love bugs the most. These little armored mammals are actually good swimmers when they need to be. They can also hold their breath for up to six minutes and are really skilled at walking underwater to cross streams. Armadillos have long been a source of food for humans. Nicknamed "poor man's pork" and "Hoover hog" by people who blamed President Hoover for the Great Depression. But all and all, they are kind of cute in a prehistoric way and add to the diversity of our Florida life.




Ocean Resorts Celebrates Nonagenarian James Howard Carlson By Lee Koesema

"Jim" was born on October 8th, 1933, in Noble, PA, changed to Elbon, (Noble backwards), when they realized they already had a town named Noble. Jim had four brothers and one sister, 3 of whom were delivered at home by grandma. When Jim was just 11 years old, he and his cousins worked at the Coal Mill gathering up coal for the family's stove. Jim's dad worked the coal mill too. The saying then was, "I owe my soul to the company store," (tough times indeed).

Jim received an unexpected Christmas card in December, 1952, a "draft notice". However, with Jim still in High School and dad on the school board, he was deferred until graduation. Jim graduated from High School in May of 1953, in Brockport, PA. He was quite good in basketball, and was considered for a scholarship with Penn State, but the Army had their own scholarship in mind for Jim.

In July of 1953, he went to Buffalo to work at the Ford Plant. During his first year at Ford he was called back into the service and in August of 1954 he entered the Army with the 101st Airborne 88th Division, training in S.C. His dad said that anyone could jump out of an airplane, but that was Jim's dream. Life being life, one morning twenty volunteers were asked to go to Korea. Jim volunteered immediately and was trained in communications as a lineman. When he told his dad he wasn't jumping out of airplanes, his dad, very relieved, asked what he would be doing, and Jim replied that he was going to be a lineman in Korea. "WHAT??!", replied his dad.....in quite the remarkable vocal range. Jim's younger brother was already over there and two more would follow.

The cold war was just starting, so Jim's orders changed again, and Jim was ordered to go to Europe (Salzburg, Austria), named for the salt mines, right across the river from the Russians. An amazing coincidence would ensue in that Ed McKee and Bob Flieth, (OR Shareholders to-be) were at that same camp, Camp Roeder, in Salzburg, Austria. Jim would ultimately become next door neighbors





foot. One time in 27 degrees below zero, and after laying wire 3 days and 3 nights, Jim developed frostbite. *An intriguing piece of trivia, Jim has a nephew, Scot, a Lieutenant Colonel, who was in charge of buying the suit Saddam Hussein would wear for his execution in Iraq.





When Jim was discharged from the Army, he returned to the Ford Plant where Ford allowed him to include the two years spent in the military to his vesting time for retirement. Jim worked for Ford Motor Company from July of 1953 until January, 1993. He met his wife, Norma, in May of 1959 when she was 16 years old. They were married in August of '59; she was 17 and Jim was 26. After losing their first three babies, they were finally blessed with two girls, Lisa and Lesley, who gave them four grandchildren and one great-grandson.

Jim worked with a man named Bob McQuinn who talked about his wonderful Florida get-a-way, called Ocean Resorts. Jim was coming close to retirement, and Bob told him if he ever made it to Florida, to look him up. Jim and Norma

took some time off and came to Florida, renting at OR for three years. Each year they would stay longer and longer. When Jim retired in 1993, they purchased their home at 5341 Compass Cove Place, where Jim still lives today. (Olive McKee gave Jim her husband Ed's shovel from the Battle of Normandy, for being such a wonderful friend and neighbor.)

Being a life long mountain man, Jim was not as excited about Florida as Norma was but eventually came to love spending the winters here. Over their many years, the couple enjoyed playing cards, particularly pinochle. They enjoyed the beach, pool, fishing, and making long-lasting friends. They had a boat for several years and Jim was fishing every chance he got. He was an active member of the Marina Committee helping with their events. His lovely wife Norma passed away ten years ago this April after being married almost 55 years. Jim still has a place in the beautiful Adirondack Mountains, in NY, and he still enjoys the summers there. After Jim lost his chihuahua and best friend, Chi Chi, he rescued a chihuahua named "Emmit". Already having a great-grandson named Emmit, he refers to them as, "Emmit #1 and "Emmit #2".

We thank you Jim for your service and for making OR your winter paradise. You sure make 90 look good!

Take a bag with you to pick up trash, especially the plastics that can harm marine life. Everyone can do small things to improve our world. Perhaps this is the message that Molinari meant to send to us.






ART IN THE PARK by Kathy Jankovic

I would like to talk about a place formerly called Captain Butchers. Last year they changed their name to the **Sebastian Saltwater Marina** – **Restaurant** – **Lodge**. We have enjoyed this lovely spot on the inter-coastal waterway for many years. They have plenty of room to dine inside, but they also have a lovely deck on which to dine if the weather is cooperative.



The menu has a wide range of seafood appetizers and entrees. We have enjoyed the huge portion of peel and eat shrimp many times. Another favorite, and one that will blow your socks off, is the Seafood Combo on the Raw Bar Menu at a cost of \$41.00. It was at least a 18-20 inches diameter bowl filled with oysters, peel and eat shrimp, tuna poke, fish dip and crackers or pita chips, You also get shrimp ceviche and it's served with cocktail sauce. To say the least, it was divine. I only got an additional bowl of lobster bisque but I did not need it as I was so full from this entree.

They also serve a Grouper Basket at \$18.00. It is hand battered, fried, and served with key lime tarter sauce, fries and coleslaw. Another favorite is the Seafood Platter at \$33.00. It contains mahi (grilled, blackened or jerked), seared jumbo shrimp, and scallops, with citrus beurre blanc, coconut rice and a fresh vegetable. Roger and I always share this and we both have plenty to eat.

And if you have room, they offer delicious key lime pie!

Do not miss the ambiance of eating out back on the deck near the boat. One night as we were dining we watched the moon rise. WOW!!! Not to mention that on the way there we saw a rocket launch. What a night that was. And by the way, it is just about two blocks past Squid Lips.

I am doing what makes me happy. I am responsible for my happiness and I owe it to my self. Happiness is a choice. You can be happy at any time, just choose to be.


Why do we have to wait to be 60 or 70 or 80? Why can't we practice this at any stage or age?
