It's Nesting Season on the Beach by Linda Smolarek

Be considerate and kind to those species who share our ocean front home. Over 30 species of shorebirds and seabirds use beach habitats for nesting, resting and finding food. Sea turtles use Florida's beaches as nesting sites from March to October. They dig nests in the sand and lay their eggs.

Here is how we can help:

- Keep out of roped or flagged beach areas even if you don't see any wildlife.
- Do not allow your dog to dig holes which could damage turtle nests or trap hatchlings. Typically a turtle digs a hole about 14 to 24 inches deep, laying 80 t 150 eggs.
- Refrain from allowing your dog or children to chase birds on the beach. This activity may result in birds abandoning nests or whole colonies moving due to disturbance.
- Avoid walking your dog on the beach at night or early pre-dawn hours during the March-October sea turtle nesting season.
- Keep your dog on a leash and avoid the areas near the dune line. Please don't let them run through the sand dunes. Stay below the wreck or tidal line.

In closing, we have a rare gift here, a beach where our dogs are allowed; to lose that privilege would be devastating to many of us who own dogs and enjoy their company on the beach.



Earth Day - Plant a Tree!

Planting trees is one of the easiest and most sustainable ways to positively affect the environment. We need trees now more than ever.



10 Reasons to plant a tree for Earth Day:

1. Trees remove carbon dioxide from the atmosphere, the major contributor to the threat of global warming. Planting trees offsets greenhouse gasses from your home and car.

2.Trees produce the pure oxygen we breathe, and remove air pollution by lowering air temperature through respiration and by retaining particulates.

3. They moderate the effects of sun and wind, and trap dust, pollen and other pollutants.

4.Planted in the right places around buildings, trees can significantly reduce air-conditioning costs and save money., cutting air-conditioning costs by 15 to 35%.

5. Trees reduce the amount of re-radiated and reflected heat from streets, buildings, and sidewalks. Trees slow cold winter/ hurricane winds and cut heating costs by 10-20%.

6. Trees increase property value by as much as 15%.

- 7. Trees make people feel good. Workers are more productive when they see trees along their commute routes and from their office windows.
- 8. They provide shelter and food for wildlife such as birds, squirrels and beneficial insects.
- 9. Trees reduce the cost of controlling stormwater. They aid soil in absorbing stormwaters into the groundwater and promote soil permeability to facilitate groundwater recharge. *This is becoming an ever-increasing problem in Ocean Resorts…plant a tree!*
- 10. Trees purify water and help make waterways safe for drinking, boating, fishing and wildlife.

So, in honor of Earth Day, think about placing a simple tree on your lot in accordance with our 20% green space per lot ordinance. The air, the water, the birds and your Ocean Resort Neighbors will thank you.

OR CELEBRATES OUR NONAGENARIANS JEAN LOCKERBY by Bill Howe




One of the best parts of working for the newsletter is interviewing someone who is or soon will be a nonagenarian....90 years of age! Jean Lockerby is just one such treasure here in our midst. You can see Jean walking the entire park roadways most mornings just after sunrise, usually carrying a walking stick behind her back. She may even, on a good day, make a second trip around the park recalling with each step the memories of living here for the past 48 winters. Jean's four adult children take turns helping get their mom to and from Florida each winter season.

Jean met her husband, Chuck, while he worked at IBM after his military service as an Intelligence Officer during the Korean War. Jean worked for the Department of the Army out of the Pentagon for several years beginning in 1953.

Jean first came to OR in 1975 with Chuck at the recommendation of their son who wanted them to enjoy the warmth of South Florida. During their first stay at OR, Chuck insisted on staying in a tent in the 'tent area' close to the tennis courts. Jean advised him, after that most uncomfortable experience, that THAT would not happen again - no more tents! They rented a used motor home until 1979 at which time they bought their current home.

Jean and Chuck had limited tennis experience before coming to OR. She played school softball and volleyball, and she took a two week tennis lesson at a YMCA near her home to prepare her for a respectable sports history at OR where she competed in tennis, bocce and swimming. Jean confesses that she never quite got the hang of breathing while going through the strokes of swimming. Jean recalls fondly how she and Chuck worked erecting the tennis shelter that still stands today at its present location.

Asked about other fond memories of her time here at OR, she was immediate in her response...."the people". She has a sizable collection of photographs from her life here at OR and there is a high probability that she has many albums at home containing photos of family members and their visits to OR. Another precious memory is of the unity of the people in the community



during the reconstruction of OR from the

dual hurricanes of 2004 when she and Chuck lost the sunroom of their current home on Inlet.

If you happen to see Jean walking the roads of OR during the morning hours, be sure to stop and give her a chance to brighten your day!

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OR CELEBRATES OUR NONAGENARIANS - DOLORIS PASCOE by Bill Howe



It is called the "Treasure Coast" because of all the hidden treasures to be found here. I found one such treasure in Doloris Pascoe right here in OR and right in plain sight. Doloris has lived in OR seasonally with her husband of 61 years, Steven, since 1969.

Invited into her home for the interview, I noticed paintings of seascapes, boat harbors, and landscapes adorning her walls. I inquired as to the artist of these paintings and she humbly said that painting is her lifelong hobby. I saw a stack of additional paintings nearly a foot tall and she stated she painted those as well. She added that her

children have already taken many for their homes and she sold 12 to her dentist, one for each of his dental office examination rooms. Remarkable artistic ability for sure.

Doloris continued supporting her family for years with her paintings and, if that was not enough, her skills in metal sculpting of home décor items she has sold through the years, often with her husband's assistance. Her Michigan home housed a workshop complete with torches, cutting tools acetylene tanks, metal saws and sheets of bronze, copper, and various other metals. She has even been recognized in the Smithsonian Institute for her metal sculpting, a very unusual activity for a female in the 1970s. And, through her design abilities she was introduced to Lee lacocca, CEO of the Chrysler Corporation, in the late 1970s, who hired her in a male dominated field, creating life size clay models of future automobile designs.





Doloris developed a hearing impairment as a child and public school made paying attention and learning difficult. So at age 16, she left school and enrolled in the Meinzinger Art School in Detroit in 1944.

While attending art school, she worked odd jobs to help with family finances, blowing glass tubes for thermometers and painting the tiny figures of people and animals that adorned musical Cuckoo Clocks popular at the time. Meinzingers closed abruptly before she graduated, completing her formal art training.

Doloris and Steve married in 1961 and Steve's love of travel and adventure took them to travel and explore Florida. Stumbling upon the entrance to OR, they rented vacant lots and stayed in their motorhome until purchasing their current home on Inlet in 1981 which, since Covid, they have made their permanent home. Residing at OR fit the bill for their family with 2 children with the Olympic size pool with a 10-meter diving board, incredible boating opportunities, and hiking opportunities in the area. She even recalls eating at the Red Hawk Restaurant, the predecessor of PV Martins (destroyed by the

2004 hurricane).

At 95 years of age, she now leaves the hiking to her husband who can be seen daily, with a walker, walking to Round Island to pick up litter and feed wildlife on the way. She calls him the most adventurous, kind, and caring man she has ever known. That, she assures me, was her first attraction to him and that is the success of their marital longevity. She is truly a treasure to find in Ocean Resorts!!

Pool News- Making a Splash by Kathy Jankovic

The pool is a popular amenity with residents and guests in the Ocean Resorts community. Please do your part to keep it healthy and clean. When you have guests, please share our simple guidelines with them.

Do you ever wonder why there is a dirty, greasy gunk line on the blue tile? It's called TSD, Total Dissolved Solids. TSD is a result of sunscreen residue, dust in the air, skin cells, sweat and urine. There's no way to make this sound pretty! Using sunscreen 15-20 minutes before you get to the pool and showering each time you get back in the pool helps keep the TSD's minimized.

At the March 29, 2023 board meeting, President Jim Buysse has asked those who use the umbrellas to close them after you use them. Please do not use the umbrellas on very windy days so they don't get broken or end up flying to the beach. Umbrellas are intended for use at the pool. It would be a shame to go back to the times when you needed to bring your own umbrella to the pool if you wanted to use one.

Lap swim is scheduled daily from 8:00-9:00 a.m. Water exercise class is scheduled daily from 9:00-10:00 a.m. Lane lines located in the decorated black bins may be used any time the pool isn't crowded or during water exercise time. It is the responsibility of the lap swimmer to put them up and to store them when you are finished using them. When using the lane line, the depth line should be placed on the pool deck. It shouldn't be floating freely in the pool.

Have a great summer and keep safe in the water.


