


Easter 2019 by Mary Wilson

Another 70th Wedding Anniversary!! Frank and Joann Koenigsknecht

Frank and Joann have been snowbirds at OR since the early 1970s but what a rich heritage they have brought to the park. Both Frank and Joann grew up on farms in central Michigan, he one of 15 siblings and she one of 10. They met when Joann was only 15 and Frank snuck into her heart when he was dating her sister around 1944. Joann's parents were very strict and did not allow Joann to date when they first met. She was only 15 at the time, he 17. In fact, Joann was never allowed to date him without their permission and supervision up to the day they were married three years later. They have been married 70 years.

Thirteen months after the wedding their first son, Michael, was born and a baby was born to them for the next five years; a total five sons

and one daughter, Heidi. Tragically, their fifth son was killed in an automobile accident on a scouting activity when he was 14.

Frank worked with the Michigan Department of Social Services until retiring at age 59 when he branched out into sales, primarily buying and selling investment property and other odd jobs. He kept very busy working long hours to put his family through colleges...not only his children but also Joann who earned a master's degree from Michigan State University in Labor Industrial Relations.

Frank's path crossed with OR "camper" Jay Holmes in the late 60s when Jay worked for him. Jay was instrumental in talking Frank and Joann into "camping" for a season at Ocean Resorts to escape Michigan's brutal winter. The Koenigsknecht's bought a 23 foot motor home and came to OR in the late 70s staying near Jay and his wife Delcia at their current site on Loggerhead. It was love at first sight. Neither had any experience in tennis or motor home living, but they were quickly surrounded by new friends Bernie and Myrtis Massat, Andy and Betty Bonetti, Jay and Delcia Holmes, and others where they took up tennis and the social life at Ocean Resorts full speed ahead. The tennis courts were crude at the time and few people played serious tennis. However, with new people moving in, the popularity grew to a major attraction at OR.

Players and residents rallied to improve the courts and build the shelter on site at their own expense and labor. With improved facilities these new players filled the courts every hour of daylight and often into the later evenings. With the growing popularity, the social attraction of the tennis players blossomed. To pay for expenses, the tennis committee sponsored pancake breakfasts once a month, and this was before a kitchen was built into the clubhouse. Joann remembers making pancakes in her home kitchen and running them down to the Clubhouse to fill hungry residents. Others made sausages, juice, coffee in their own kitchen, hustling them to the clubhouse for awaiting ticket holders. This was a dedicated group who knew how to have fun and work hard. Players were also seen frequently sporting T-shirts emblazoned with OR Tennis logo designed by Fran Baxter. Joann says the spirit of fun and hard work flourished in the park in those early days.

Eventually, in 1994 the Koenigsknecht's built the home they currently own on their present lot. Although Frank's health did not allow him to travel to OR this year, Joann considered them blessed and they take great pride in helping make OR what it is today, "our little bit of paradise!". With her 90th birthday approaching soon, she still has pride that she can play tennis and take part in so many other social activities in the park today.

NATURE AT OR by Linda Smolarek

Take a walk on the ocean and enjoy the sight of beach sunflowers as you step off the boardwalk (left side). Bright yellow single, daisy-like flowers with a black disk have simple wedge-shaped leaves and are a member of the aster family. Beach sunflower, dune sunflower or beach daisy is a perennial. This ground cover plant is native to coastal dunes of Florida. It likes our sandy soil and is nicely tolerant of dry conditions and grows naturally on sand dunes along with other native plants in full sun.

Fun fact: the flower heads always follow the sun throughout the day. Another feature of the beach sunflower is its ability to attract wildlife; several

species of butterflies appreciate the flowers and the fruits attract birds. Plants root wherever stems touch the ground and spread by underground rhizomes but need rejuvenation after two or three years of growth. As plants age, they become woody and exhausted. Native Americans used the flowers to produce pale green and purple-black colors for body painting and dying their pottery, baskets and fabric. So next time you walk by stop and say hello to this colorful Florida native gracing our beach!


POOL COMMITTEE by Sue Ertel




LET'S EAT OUT by Sharon English

The dialogue is sharp and the humor dry in these unusually reflective detective stories. These are stand alone books, no need to read them in order. Pick one up at the library and settle down for a good read.

I am writing from Cape Cod, where it has rained for the last 20 days, the wind howls and the temps average in the low fifties. This is the time of year and the weather that makes me appreciate the opportunity for uninterrupted reading. So many books, so much rain. Bring on the quilt and a cup of tea!.
