

POOL NEWS - Making a Splash by Kathy Jankovic

The Ocean Resorts pool is one of the most popular amenities in our complex. It's been said it's the best pool on the island. In addition to a great pool cleaning technician there is a group of volunteers who take time to tidy up the pool area.

A special thanks goes to the volunteers who help put up the wind break in early November. Those persons were: Denny Marginet, Bob Obidzinski, Artie and Mary Kearns, Gloria Almedia, Kathy Rohe, Tassy Davis, and John and Nancy Provance. A special shout out goes to Bob

Obidinski who helps keep our pool looking tidy. Every morning after his swim, Bob straightens the blue lounge chairs and the white tables and chairs. He returns errant items to storage bins in addition to tossing any trash that might be left behind. When you see Bob, please tell him thanks.

Lap swimming is scheduled every morning from 8:00-9:00 a.m. Lane lines are stored in the black containers next to the grey container of exercise equipment. If you use the lane lines it is your responsibility to put them up and take them down. If you wish to swim laps at other times, the depth line may be taken down by asking other pool users first. Use good judgment. If the pool is crowded, especially if young children are present, please try another time for your lap swim.

Weather permitting, water exercise class is scheduled from 9:00 - 10:00 a.m. daily. If you're looking for a great way to ease sore muscles this is a comfortable start. Nancy Provance leads the class through a series of exercises that work every muscle group. Her assistant leaders are Gloria Almeida, Christiana Arsenault & Kathy Rohe.

You can help this beautiful area of our paradise by cleaning up after yourself. Thanks for returning chairs when you move them. Help keep the area safe by not bringing any breakable items inside the fenced pool area. Broken glass or mug ceramic is not kind to bare feet. If it's very windy, please do not open table umbrellas. When you leave, close the umbrella. It may not be windy when you leave but weather conditions change quickly.

Children under the age of 7 should be under the constant and immediate supervision of a responsible adult. Sunscreen protects your skin better if it is applied 10-15 minutes before you come out in the sunshine. Everyone must shower before entering the pool, even if you have showered before you came to the pool. Showering before you get into chlorinated water keeps skin from drying when it's wet from showering; less chlorine is absorbed into skin. It keeps your skin looking younger when you shower first.

If you see any unsafe conditions or broken equipment please contact the office.
