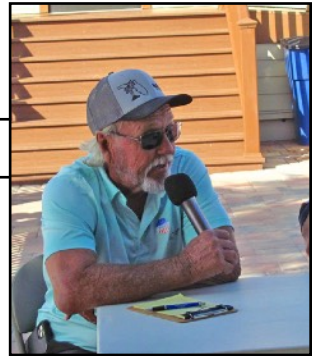

BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS COMMITTEE

The first project for the newly constituted Buildings and Grounds Committee (B&G) was completed after the 2023 hurricane season ended.

The B&G committee was tasked with getting quotes for the cost of replacing the wind curtains that hang over the pavilion openings. Costs were estimated to be around \$9,000 - \$11,000. After examining the curtains and hardware, it was determined that the curtains were structurally in good condition and only needed cleaning and hardware replacement.



The cost for the replacement hardware was approximately \$220, so in May, 2023, B&G's new Chairman Dave Unger, along with Gregg Finkel and Ralph Meyer, removed all curtains. The curtains were then power washed and hand-scrubbed to remove paint overspray from previous pavilion painting. New hardware was replaced on two curtain panels to determine how long it would take to clean and replace. It was also determined that each curtain had to be placed in a particular opening in order to fit.

On November 21, 2023, B&G Co-Chair Tom McCarthy, along with Dan Maroushek, Gregg and Ralph, replaced the rest of the panels with the new hardware and placed each curtain panel into the correct opening and marked each with a number to make for ease in future removal, cleaning and replacing.

The B&G committee hopes to be able to participate in more projects in the future to help keep Ocean Resorts assets maintained and keep our costs down.

ELLA GRACE

I'd like to introduce you to Ella Grace. She is 13 years old and she is here at Ocean Resorts for the winter with her family. Mom and Dad, Kate and Jordan, and her younger siblings, Arya (10) and Kai (8) found a site to purchase at 5276 Fourwinds Way in 2021 after renting in OR for several years. They are from the Pickering area of Ontario, Canada.

Ella was 5 years old when she noticed all of the plastic on a beach of Lake Ontario. Even then she was concerned about the impact that this garbage could have on the wildlife. At certain times, when the east wind is blowing, our coasts in Florida can have quite a lot of plastic washing up on the shore. Since Ella has been an environmentalist from such a young age, it is not surprising that she decided that she'd like to do something to help with the situation. Her goal is to

create a system whereby people can get a bucket on their way to the beach to pick up as much garbage as they'd like, dump the garbage in a can at our boardwalk, and leave the bucket in its stand for the next person to use.

To achieve this goal, she is asking the residents at Ocean Resorts to save their aluminum cans and deliver them to their Fourwind's site where she will crush them and take them to the scrap metal recyclers. They are paid 40¢ per pound for aluminum. Ella estimates that one of the beach clean up stations will cost \$125.00. That translates to 312 pounds of aluminum. To meet that goal Ella needs to collect around 7700 cans. Surely the residents of OR can help with that...LOL!!

Ella enjoys visiting the Loggerhead Marine-life Center in Juno Beach. It is one of Florida's most visited nonprofit scientific destinations which is focused on ocean and sea turtle conservation. They are committed to the rehabilitation of sick and injured sea turtles. Ella's other hobbies include reading, artistic endeavors, including drawing and watercolors, and learning the guitar.

Ella and her siblings are being homeschooled by their parents. This will be perfect as they plan on sailing through the Bahamas the summer of 2024. Ella appreciates any opportunity where she can use her voice and energies towards meeting her goals.

Statistics over the years have proven that paper management is one of the biggest organizing challenges known to modern mankind. It is a force that affects our productivity, our energy, our time, finances, and everyday lives...for better or worse. Please join my quest and empower your New Year 2024 by taking (making) time to review the contents of your own paper stash. Whether you file or pile, January is a great time to purge! Out with the old to make room for the new!

In honor of National Get Organize Month and to inspire and stimulate your own paper management awareness, below are some tips and thoughts to consider when reviewing your current filing system and minimizing paper clutter. LET’S DO THIS!

- **There are only THREE (3) TYPES of files:**
 - a. **ACTION:**
 - a. On-going (bills, calls, appointments, etc.)
 - b. Temporary (projects: reno, research, etc.)
 - b. **REFERENCE:** (main file type frequently accessed - contracts, receipts, subscriptions, medical records, etc.)
 - c. **ARCHIVE:** (rarely accessed - old taxes, professional/college transcripts, family history, etc.)
- **Before filing anything...ask yourself:**
 - o Do I need this now?
 - o Do I need this for my future?
 - o Can I get it somewhere else?
 - o Is it recent enough to be useful?
 - o Any tax or liability implications?
 - o What is the worst thing that could happen if I toss it?

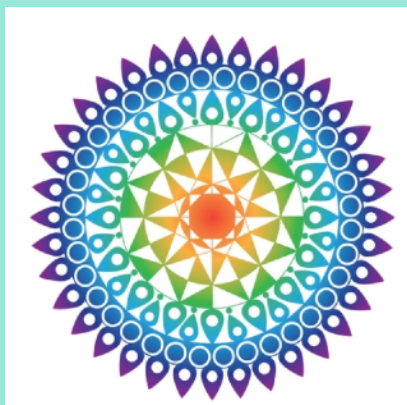

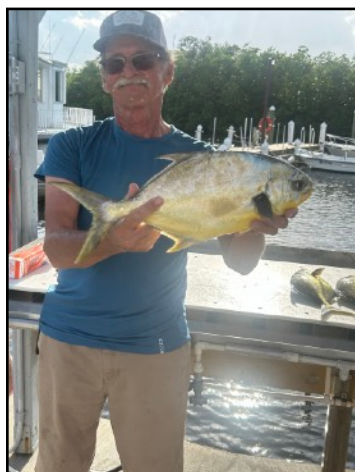
In the evenings there is a variety of music with talented singers. I think we've found a new favorite spot to dine in Fort Pierce.

We would like to thank the volunteers for all their hard work and for making it a success. The Marina Spaghetti Dinner Committee, Sharon McSweeny, Chair



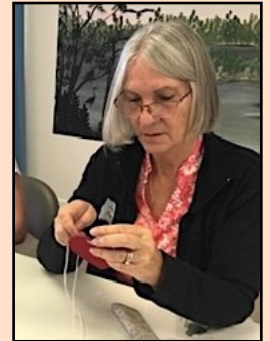


ART IN THE PARK - Something to Do When It Rains by Kathy Jankovic

Cibby's painting session will be rescheduled before March. Those who signed up will be contacted. If you aren't in the directory your phone number is the only way to let you know about changes.

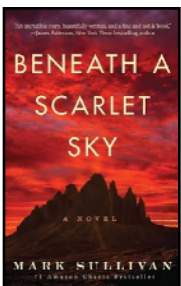

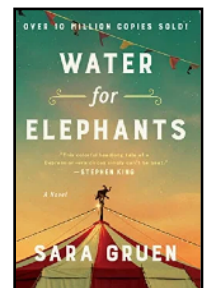
THE JOY OF READING by Nancy Wilder

OR PETS by Nancy Wilder

Not my usual article, but this is a shoutout to all dog-owning Ocean Resorts owners and renters. One of my great joys is a morning and afternoon walk with my wonderful, incredible DixieRose. We usually head towards the post office, the unofficial dog meet and greet area. The people chat, the dogs mingle and perhaps get a treat from one of the “cookie ladies”. Recent conversations have been about dog poop, and the frequent sightings around Ocean Resorts. Some of our neighbors are kind enough to clean up droppings despite it not being from their dog. This should not have to happen. We have many “poop stations” with bags and disposal bins. Not picking up after your dog is disrespectful to our neighbors and our community. I encourage responsible dog owners to keep an eye out for the perpetrators. We should hold ourselves, all of us, to a high standard of dog care and community responsibility. To the guilty dog owners, start picking up. The “poop patrol” will be on the lookout!

Editor’s Note: Ed Santa’s sister, Romaine, shared an article with me from the Walla Walla Veterinary Medical Center. It contained 4 important facts about dog poop: 1) Dog poop is classified as a pollutant by the EPA; 2) Intestinal parasites from dog poop can be transmitted to people and other pets; 3) Bacteria can be found in your dog’s stool; and 4) Parvovirus can easily infect other dogs. All of these can be contained by picking up your dog’s poop and depositing it in the appropriate containers.
