O.R. Celebrates our Nonagenarians TOM KISSELLE

It is a rare and treasured moment when you get to talk with a 90-year-old, especially one who is one of the early settlers at OR. Tom, with his wife Judy, are two such treasures who appreciate and love to tell of their early years of marriage here at the infancy of Ocean Resorts.

Tom and Judy married in 1961 near Bowling Green University in Ohio. At the time, Tom had quite an athletic history having played football (tight end) at BGU, then, later on the US Marine football team as assistant coach while assigned to an armored tank unit overseas. After leaving the Marines Tom continued his coaching experience at Kent State University and Western Michigan University. At this time, Tom would escape the cold northern climates of Michigan and Ohio with Judy to visit his father who was assigned to the Space Center in Cape Canaveral Florida. Exploring the east coast of Florida on one such visit, Tom and Judy stopped by Ocean Resorts and were impressed with the pool, marina and several athletic opportunities. At that time, most of the lots at OR were camping or trailer sites.

Tom and Judy lived on Fourwinds Way for the first several years at OR then moved near the tennis courts. Naturally, having a handball background from his time in the Marines, he was drawn to play tennis, eventually playing for OR's traveling team. Having been the recipient of some of Tom's lightning serves and magical spins to the tennis ball, I can attest to his high level of athleticism. His competitive spirit bled over to his swimming, bocci and to the traveling softball team, then coached by current OR resident, Dan Darrow.




Following the 2004 hurricane that struck OR, Tom and Judy bought their present home next to the Post Office in 2006. Tom says that his dogs have played a big part of his time at OR having raised several German Shepherds and Labs on the beach and streets of OR. He told me that he has boarded dogs at their rural home in Ohio for 23 years as their sons manage the kennels in their absence while at OR.

Tom says many of his longtime friends have not been able to return to OR and he misses them. However, he says that he still values the friendly atmosphere here in the park and appreciates that hospitality

and goodwill remain the same as new faces filter in.







From O.R. it's approximately a 37 - 40 minute easy drive on the South Island. You can ask for an ocean view table, but seriously every table has a lovely view. The four of us opted to look at a dinner menu where we found a delicious sounding item. It was called Crab Oscar Filet with Bernaise Sauce, mashed potatoes, and grilled asparagus. Not cheap at \$85 but large enough to share. Domenic was our waiter and was cheerful and attentive. As soon as drinks were ordered, a basket of delicious warm rolls arrived with plenty of whipped butter.

The views of the ocean are spectacular throughout the restaurant. There is also a bar/patio area in case you prefer sitting outside. So, back to the food. 

I remember when libraries were very different. Stern librarians glared at you even if you whispered, books had fines if late in return (no more fines!) It was a place to get in and out of quickly. Thats all changed. Libraries are community centers now, a place for all to enjoy in multiple ways.



NATURE AT OR - A Seldom Seen Visitor by Linda Smolarek



We were graced with the visit of bobcat, witnessed and photographed by Bill Howe last month. Thanks Bill!

Often confused with lynx, bobcats are found from southern Canada, down through the USA and Mexico. Unlike the lynx, they are not found in the northern latitudes where deep snow restricts their movements.

These tough little cats survive mainly because they are secretive, cantankerous, and are habitat generalists, meaning they use almost all types of habitats; forest, fields, swamps, urban areas, beaches, and some agricultural areas. Mainly ground dwellers, they prefer areas with thick cover for hunting and will commonly climb trees or swim in search of food. They are opportunistic carnivores and will eat whatever they can catch, preferring rabbits and rodents. Bobcats will also eat small reptiles, birds and carrion. Most of their hunting is done at dawn, dusk and through the night but it is not uncommon to be seen in the daylight.

Males and females associate only during the breeding season. They are twice as large as a

domestic cat with brown/tan and white fur, small black spots and a short "bobbed" tail tipped with black. Their body length is between 2-4 ft, weighing about 15-35 lbs, and they can live 3-4 years in the wild. Thankfully, bobcats are thriving throughout most of their range, but fragmented landscape has limited the resilience of these little cats. Rapid development in Florida may be reaching a threshold within which even the bobcat cannot persist.

Because predators are a critical component of a healthy ecosystem, it is important to monitor bobcat populations and implement conservation actions. Bobcats are native to Florida and connecting tracts of suitable habitat for bobcats and their prey may help keep stable populations and prevent bobcats from joining so many of their feline cousins on threatened and endangered species lists.

How to help: support wildlife on your property by growing native plants and thick cover. Reduce urban conflicts by securing garbage cans, monitoring small pets and keeping food indoors.

Rest assured that bobcats do not attack people. In fact, bobcat attacks are virtually unknown. However, never attempt to touch or handle a wild bobcat or her kittens. If you see a bobcat pick up small children or pets, give the bobcat space and back away slowly. Let the bobcat know you are there by talking or making noise. If the animal approaches you, stomp the ground, clap your hands or yell loudly.

It's nice to know there is a bit of wild joining us on our island paradise of Ocean Resort.
