FASHIONS BY TIFFANY



Ocean Resorts salutes our Nonagenarians - Barbara Sydow by Nancy Wilder

Born on December 10,1929, Barbara was the second of five siblings raised on a farm in Hopkinton, Massachusetts. It was a happy childhood with strict and loving parents. Education was valued highly, and good grades and homework were a top priority. Church was also an important part of the family's life.

In high school, Barbara moved with her family to nearby Ashland, MA. Barbara was a good student, played basketball and became a cheerleader. After graduation, she attended Wilfred Academy in Boston to study hair and beauty design, eventually working in a local salon.

About that time, Barbara met her soon to be husband, George. Tall, good-looking and a little older, George was considered a "good catch". But most important, as soon as they met, "it was love at first sight". George and Barbara were married for 55 years and raised two children in their lakefront home in Framingham MA. And now there are three grown grandchildren and six great grands! George did very well in his career and owned two auto dealerships. It was a busy time, the family was involved in scouts, Sunday school, sports, music (Barbara plays the organ), and all



the boating and water skiing the lake provided. Not busy enough, Barbara had a professional hair salon built in the house. While the children napped or when George was home, she saw clients. The neighbors thought it was wonderful to have someone so talented, close by.

In 1988,After the children were grown, Barbara and George moved to a Florida golf community. Golf was their passion, Barbara says "we played golf eight times a week". They also found time for bridge, church and many community activities. George died about ten years later after a long struggle with Parkinson's. Barbara eventually moved to Lake in the Woods in Vero and joined a church group for grieving family members. Always ready to help, she was very active in the group for several years and gave much support to the members.

It was in that group that Barbara met Jay Holmes, her beloved companion of almost 9 years. Jay eventually convinced Barbara to move to OR and their life together began. Barbara took up tennis at 80, and Barbara and Jay were regulars at the tennis courts. Avid travelers, Barbara and Jay counted 20 cruises on Princess Line, river cruises, trips to China, Japan, New Zealand, Australia and more. They had great times all over the world. Jay passed away in 2016.

Today, Barbara continues an active life, still playing tennis, knitting, crocheting, meditation and daily exercise, Barbara's hand knit sweaters are treasured by their owners. Made to order or available at the craft show, the sweaters are beautiful, with intricate detail. She also crochets lush afghans and lovely



infant items. Barbara is a regular church goer and is still involved with the grief group.

When asked for words of wisdom for the Ocean Resort community, Barbara does not hesitate to encourage us to be kind and caring of one another. That's the Ocean Resort spirit she loves and wants to maintain.

Ocean Resorts salutes our Nonagenarians - John Virgilio by Bill Howe

John Viriglio and Phyllis, his wife of nearly 65 years, have been at Ocean Resorts for 23 years. This past June, John celebrated his 90th birthday at his Henrietta, N.Y. home, a home that he has occupied since his birth in 1929.

John and Phyllis originally found OR while vacationing after retirement near Okeechobee and



Ocala, Florida. The first 5 years they rented on Osprey and Galley Way. The draw of the ocean and the pet-friendly atmosphere of Ocean Resorts solidified their desire to become shareholders on Fourwinds Way. John enjoyed sitting on the beach and listening to the waves, however he is quick to say he never learned to swim.

John has been retired for several years, but has enjoyed a varied and colorful life, working since he was just 14 as a farm hand. John went to work in a cider mill when he was 16, often sneaking "hard cider" to hide in the barn to "enjoy later". From there John became a custodial engineer at a local high school where he later semi-retired. Phyllis worked 7 more years as a teacher so John, after retirement, went to Nazareth College and received training in Boiler Engineering, schooling that led him to be responsible for the boilers on the Nazareth campus.

When John came to OR he immediately saw the potential in the long vegetable growing season during his 5-month stay and planted 55 tomato plants, numerous pepper varieties and a special garlic crop. Generous with his labors, John and Phyllis shared the 'product of their labors' with neighbors when they left for the season.



His favorite times at OR were attending the old time Country Western Dances at the pavilion. John added that he is talking of the "old time" country music of the 50s and 60s, not the contemporary brand that the younger set line dance with today. The highlight of John's seasonal visit is when he and Phyllis host an historic railroad documentary each year in the clubhouse involving both railway travel videos and discussion. John is well known in Henrietta where he bought and installed a retired steam locomotive in his front yard. That is dedication to a hobby!

John concludes that OR, all around, "cannot be beat. It is a beautiful place to bring our dogs, to grow vegetables and be near the ocean".



NATURE at OR: Turtle or Tortoise? by Linda Smolarek

The slow moving turtles we see crossing the road are actually gopher tortoise, a species of land turtles, native to southeastern United States. The gopher tortoise is a keystone species because the burrows it creates provide shelter for at least 360 other animal species. On average burrows are 14 feet long and 6 feet deep. The gopher tortoise often lives in more than one burrow spending 80% of its time underground.

They are herbivores and can live 40-60 years in the wild and 90+ years in captivity.

The male has a concave plastron or shell, while the bottom shell of a female is flat. To estimate the age pick out one 'scute' (ring on shell) and count the inner rings to determine age.

Gopher tortoises cannot swim and easily drown. The mating season is April through July. The females lays her eggs in the sandy mound in front of a burrow known as the "apron" to ensure there is plenty of sunlight for incubation.

If a turtle is crossing the road, safely park your car and move the turtle to the far side of the road in the direction it was traveling in...

The primary threat to gopher tortoise is habitat destruction.

There is a Gopher Tortoise Smartphone App to report any gopher tortoises you encounter. If you suspect that someone has unlawfully destroyed or harmed a gopher tortoise or its burrow, report it to FWC's toll-free Wildlife Alert hotline at 1-888404-3922 or text TIP@MyFWC.com

I continued fishing and finally caught a Snook:






SHARK!!!!

THE HISTORY OF OCEAN RESORTS

This month we are starting a recurring column about the History of Ocean Resorts. The information and pictures will all be taken from the official Ocean Resort History website created and maintained through 2016 by Carolyn and John Leaman, former residents of OR. We want to thank Carolyn and John for the many hours of research and development they put into creating this website. Credits for information and pictures will be noted, if available. Unfortunately, although the website is still 'live' on the internet, it is not being updated at this time. If anyone is interested in looking at the website, it can be found at **historyor.com**.



The story of the development of Ocean Resorts began when one of the first registered pieces of property on the Island was purchased from the government by Mr. Daniel McConville. He purchased all of the land that is now known as Avalon Park, Ocean Harbour North and Ocean Resorts. The plat plan was recorded in 1891 in the County of Brevard -- St. Lucie County did not become a County until much later. The transaction was recorded on September 1, 1891.

O.R. opened as a campground in the 70's. By 1978 the campground was called Bryn Mawr CampResort. Bryn Mawr Corporation was a struggling - 9 million in debt -- real estate, restaurant and bus company. 51.5% of it was bought by entrepreneurs Gino N. Pala and David K. Brewster. Mr. Pala moved to Florida and began selling off Bryn Mawr's assets. This resulted in \$25 million in assets for Bryn Mawr. Pala and Brewster then bought 13 percent of the Joseph Dixon Crucible Company. The pair convinced them to approve a merger between Bryn Mawr and the company became the Dixon Ticonderoga Company, in 1983. Headquarters were shifted to Vero Beach, Florida -- the home of Bryn Mawr.

Consequently, during these times, 1978 - 1983, the Bryn Mawr CampResort, became: Bryn Mawr Ocean Resort, then Ocean Resorts Coop Inc. Lots were sold as a unit with a Proprietary Lease. The developer sold lots for the first few years until all 400 units were gone. The final lots being sold about the end of 1983.



Each unit had a connection for recreational vehicles with water, sewage and electrical hookups provided. Each owner was given a Proprietary Lease, Articles of Incorporation, By-Laws and Rules and Regulations. Because it was still a recreation vehicle park with the right to rent out the units owned by shareholders, rules and regulations were necessary.

THE HISTORY OF OCEAN RESORTS (continued)





Original owners were given a prospectus at the time of sale. A Board of Directors was established with owners and developers, consisting of seven individuals. They were elected for three year terms, the first year with staggered terms. The longest an owner could occupy a lot (unit) in one year was six months. When the developer finished sales, the Board was comprised of seven owners. The transfer was painful. The last of the lots were being sold by the Developer in 1983.

The original lots consisted of a cement pad large enough for a travel trailer or small motor home and an asphalt drive. As some were negotiating purchases, a cement pad, roughly 10' x 40' was being poured and landscaping installed. The demand for larger pads on the units was being addressed. The electricity was not adequate for the larger RV's manufactured and more changes were necessary. Trash became a problem and the expansion of some of the facilities necessary.

Mobile Homes were being manufactured and owners wanted permanent dwellings and longer occupancy. Rules and Regulations and Governing Documents were constantly under revision because of owner demands. St. Lucie County finally granted year around occupancy and began to tax owners for the units. Park Models and any improvements were added to the tax roles. At the same time, at least three quarters of the units were occupied by RV's.

The park owned a store/office building, four comfort stations with Laundromats, a recreation building and almost Olympic size pool with diving boards, a dirt floored small maintenance shop, a closed pavilion which

held all kinds of pin ball machines and similar games, two tennis courts, a small marina with one dock, four shuffle board courts, 1,000 feet of open beach, security gates and a guard house, water lines, sewage lines, and electric lines. There was roughly 3.8 miles of road, fencing and a storage area. The private docks along the river were a dream. The recreation building had two fire places.

There was a very small play area for children. There were no street lights. The palm trees in the park were added as the lots were sold. Owners were entitled to trees on a lot when purchased, if they were not already planted. Through the years, there were many more amenities and facilities added.
