MANAGER'S REPORT Todd Holcomb, CAM

Good afternoon. I hope everyone is doing well. If your unit was impacted by the storm I ask you to please address skirting, soffit, fascia and/or any other storm related repairs on your unit as you return to the Co-Op if those repairs are still lingering.

Everyone is reminded that the only animals allowed in any of the common buildings are working service animals as outlined in Ocean Resorts Rules and Regulations Article 1.F.1. Service animals are defined by the American's with Disabilities Act (ADA) as animals that are individually trained to do work or perform tasks for people with disabilities. Only dogs and miniature horses are eligible to be trained as service animals. Dogs or miniature horses whose sole function is to provide comfort or emotional support do not qualify as service animals under the ADA. Please keep this in mind whenever you enter any common buildings.

Please don't put trash out the night before the scheduled pick up day in a garbage bag as the critters tend to get into it and it gets strewn everywhere causing our volunteers to have to take additional time to ensure it is all cleaned

up. If you decide to put your trash out the night before, please put it in a container with a lid to avoid the aforementioned mess.

Please adhere to Ocean Resorts posted speed limits and traffic control signs such as stop, one way, do not enter, etc.

Jim the Postman asked me to remind everyone to check your mailbox especially if you have ordered something. He said that some mailboxes are typically full and aren't routinely checked.

That a delinquent unit owner shall be responsible for all of the Association's collection costs including the Association's reasonable attorney's fees. Any delinquent payment received by the Association shall be applied first to any interest accrued by the Association, then to any administrative late fee, then to any costs and reasonable attorney's fees incurred in collection, and then to the delinquent assessment, reference Ocean Resorts By-Law 6.3.c and Florida Statute 719.108.3

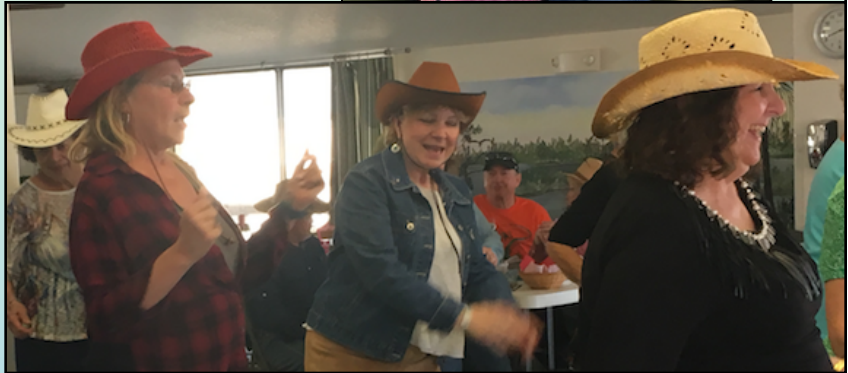

MARINA COMMITTEE **By Ferdie Bruckler,** **Dockmaster and Chairman**

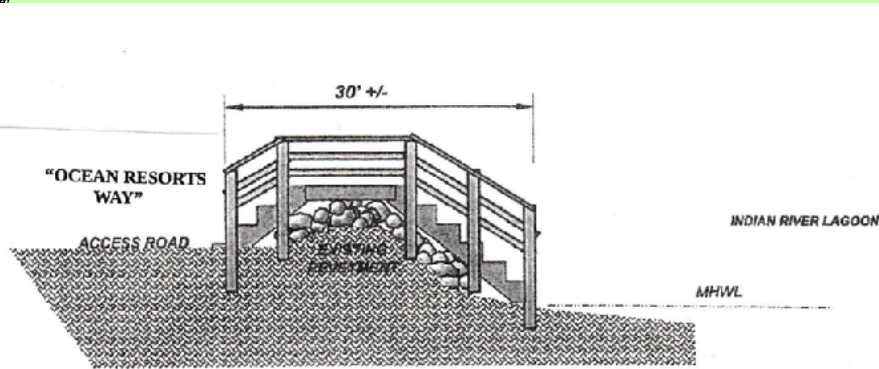

The Access License Agreement between Ocean Resorts and St. Lucie County was approved 7-0 at the January 18, 2018 Board Meeting. The Board of County Commissioners has received the Agreement. It remains essentially the same as the original agreement sent by the County Attorney Daniel S. McIntire on September 29, 2017.



The Agreement establishes that the county is granted access to our 65 acres of peninsula land for their mosquito control needs. The county agrees to mark their east and west borders and place two signs stating "Private Property

Beyond This Point". The Agreement calls for building a 30 foot bridge over the rock (revetment) barrier on our west shore.

This has been the result of 16 years of effort by many, many shareholders. TREASURE COAST BREWERIES - The Treasure Coast has become a destination for beer lovers! Who knew? Last year there was an article in the local paper about how micro/craft breweries are popping up and attracting beer lovers to our area. We have tried Islamorada Beer Co. and Sailfish Brewing Co., both located in St. Lucie County.



Recently, we learned of American Icon Brewery in Vero Beach, billed as both a brewery and a gastropub. This former power plant building is impressive both inside and out. American Icon Brewery sits along the railroad tracks and to me, the train adds to the ambiance. The two story building has indoor and outdoor seating, fire pits and a happy, lively atmosphere. Well, why not, beer makes people happy! The beers are delicious and the bartenders are very glad to give you samples. As for the gastropub part, it's a fine place for burgers, tacos, sliders and appetizers. THE ISLAND TIMES CELEBRATES OCEAN RESORTS RESIDENT, JOHN VIRIGLIO

Who has not had a life's dream put off, never finding the right time or means to fulfill that dream, resulting in regrets? That is not the case with John Viriglio, OR owner on Fourwinds Way for almost 20 years. Eighty-eight year old John and his lovely wife Phyllis live in Rochester, N.Y. when not with us in the park. His lifelong fascination with the railroad may not give him celebrity status here but it certainly makes him a most interesting character and authority on life on the rails.

In a nutshell, John, coming from a family with a long history with rail employment, came across a 1923 Yard Engine destined for the scrap heap when diesel engines made their debut. John worked for the railroad repairing track as a "gandy dancer", then became a brakeman and fireman feeding coal to the steam engines firebox. With the advent of the diesel engines, the steam engines were phased out of service. By this time John worked with a torch to cut up the now defunct steam engines for recycling. In 1964, when he saw a 35 ton Yard Engine he knew as "Old Five Spot" headed to the smelting pot, John knew he had to rescue the still functional steamer. Pleading his case to the Rochester Iron Works, John found that he could purchase Old Five Spot for \$1200. A lot of money for the time, John gave a substantial down payment with friends and family holding dinners at the local fire house. As a project, school children went door to door getting donations to close the deal. John was soon the proud owner of the yard engine, however an even larger problem loomed ahead...moving her to his property 7 miles away.

With the donation of 400 feet of track, John got a group of volunteers to help lay the track in one day. Moving the locomotive to John's home was an even larger problem if this was going to be a successful relocation. Again, volunteer help was a phone call away with the offer of a huge crane and a lowboy trailer that could haul the 35 ton engine. Reporters from all over New York documented the day long, 7-mile move and the placement of Old Five Spot on John's property. John planned a museum to accompany the steam engine and donations of RR memorabilia flooded in. In no time John's Museum found its way into the New York Vacation Guide. When

large tour busses began arriving with groups wanting tours, John called a halt to public admission for two reasons: his neighbors did not want tour busses parking all over the neighborhood and much of John's memorabilia was rare and valuable. Security was a problem with an expensive solution.

Today John's steam engine adorns his yard and this museum is open to acquaintances by word of mouth only. Asked if he ever put pennies on the rails, he smiled and said, "oh yes, more than I can count." If you see John with Phyllis walking their two dogs around the park early in the morning, feel free to bring up your interest in the railroad and prepare to listen. Each season at OR John and Phyllis host a video in the community building showcasing rail travel. This year's one hour video featured a trip from New York to San Francisco. More than 20 persons attended the delightful trip with a host of homemade refreshments. My recommendation is to NOT miss this next year.

THE NATURE OF OCEAN RESORTS

Not a day goes by on our beautiful island when the v-shaped flying wedge of pelicans fails to delight and entertain us...

One of our largest water birds, pelicans are fascinating creatures with their long beak and a specialized throat pouch used to catch prey. They must breathe through their beaks because their nostrils are actually hidden glands used to remove excess salt from the blood stream - a very useful adaptation for a marine bird.



Fossil evidence of pelicans dates back to at least 30 million years and they are thought to have evolved in the Old World and spread to the Americas.

There are eight species of pelicans found on all continents except Antarctica and the deep oceans. Most pelicans frequent inland coastal waters, primarily warm regions where they feed on fish, catching them at or near the water surface. They are excellent fishermen, their bill holds over three buckets of fish. Watch them fly low over stretches of water, using a phenomenon known as ground effect to reduce drag and increase lift.

Being gregarious birds, they travel in flocks, hunting cooperatively and breeding colonially. In our area, the adult brown pelicans are gray-brown birds with yellow heads and white necks. When breeding, the plumage on the back and sides of the neck turn a deep reddish brown. The male and female are similar. Juvenile birds are dirty brown all over with a white belly for the first three years. Breeding pairs are monogamous for only a single season, roosting in near by mangroves. The male brings the nesting material and the female heaps the material to form a simple structure. They incubate the eggs with the skin of their feet, standing on the eggs to keep them warm. A usual clutch size is one to three eggs, both sexes incubate, and incubation takes 30-36 days.

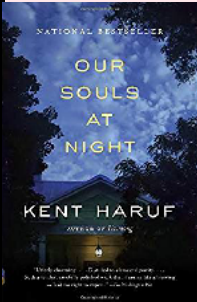
Did you know pelicans have a network of subcutaneous air sacs under the skin along the throat, breast, wings and in their bones? These air sacs are connected to the respiratory system and serve to keep the pelican remarkably buoyant in the water. Most importantly, these air sacs cushion the impact of the pelican's body when they dive in flight from heights of 33-66 feet, plunging head-first into water. The force of impact stuns their prey which are immediately swallowed. On a hot summer day they can dissipate excess heat by rippling the skin of the throat and pouch with the bill open to promote evaporative cooling.

After nearly disappearing from North America in the 1960's and 1970's due to the pesticide DDT, Brown Pelicans have made a full comeback thanks to pesticide regulations. Stop by the marina or pause along the ocean and watch nature's living fossils, they are a sight to behold.

THE JOY OF READING By Nancy Wilder

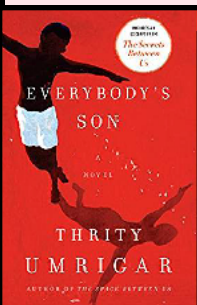
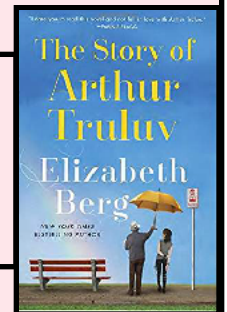
