NATURE AT OCEAN RESORTS by Linda Smolarek

Why we love Seagrapes: Seagrapes are a woody tree with circular, hand size cardboard stiff leaves. New leaves are glossy red and old leaves turn brick-red before falling in the winter. Lengths of small ivory-colored flowers bloom in early summer and produce clusters of green grapes on only the

female trees. The mature fruits are purple and seldom seen because the ripe fruits are quickly eaten by a variety of birds.

Seagrapes are the dominant woody plant on many south Florida dunes. This sturdy, salt-resistant tree protects other plants and preserves the dunes during hurricanes.





We developed a new appreciation for the seagrapes during Hurricane Nicole. Because the hurricane was

predicted to be only a Category 1, my family decided not to evacuate and ride out the storm. Thankfully, by hurricane standards, the storm was mild but we made some interesting observations. During the height of the hurricane my husband went to the beach and was amazed at the difference in wind speed behind the seagrapes. The tall stand of seagrapes to the left of our boardwalk almost completely stopped the wind opposed to the shorter growth to the right. Our house is surrounded by seagrapes and hedge-type palms; the wind almost unnoticeable and the seagrapes seemingly impervious to the power of the wind. This is simply a casual, informal

observation but made us think how we want to continue to protect our property and the property of Ocean Resort in the the future. Green space is good!

Like the mangrove, seagrapes are protected because they play an important role in maintaining our beautiful coastal environment. So, when landscaping or adding green space to your property, think seagrapes. It's native, protects your home, is edible and makes a great jelly!

Lap swim is scheduled from 8:00-9:00 a.m. daily. Lap lane lines are available if you want to swim laps at other times. They are located in the bins next to the

exercise equipment. It's your responsibility to put them up and take them down after you swim laps. Use common sense if the pool is crowded.

The pool windbreak was installed on December 12, 2022 with the help of Lynn D., Kathy R., Ed S., Gloria A., Deb B., Kim W., Barb G., Joan N. and Kathy J. Gloria lead the volunteers and lots of helpful hands made the project a success. The pool committee will look into obtaining an additional pool break section to cover the north end of the pool. The area was previously protected by the large, outdated pool cover apparatus.



The pool committee will continue to explore options to chill the pool in the summer.

REMINDERS • County health regulations require all pool users to shower before getting into the pool. Yes, even if you just showered at home. In addition, wet skin doesn't absorb chlorine. Chlorine and pool chemicals cause skin dryness. You look younger when you shower first. • Jets are set to properly circulate the chemicals. Leave them alone. • For safety reasons do not prop open the pool gates. • Refrain from hanging or standing on the depth marker rope. It's not designed to support weight. • Be courteous and return tables and chairs to their original positions if you move them. Clean up food spills on the tables you use. • Sunscreen protects your skin best when you apply it 10-20 minutes before you go outside. • Only bottled water is permitted near the pool. All other food & drink must be kept 3 feet or more away from the pool.


